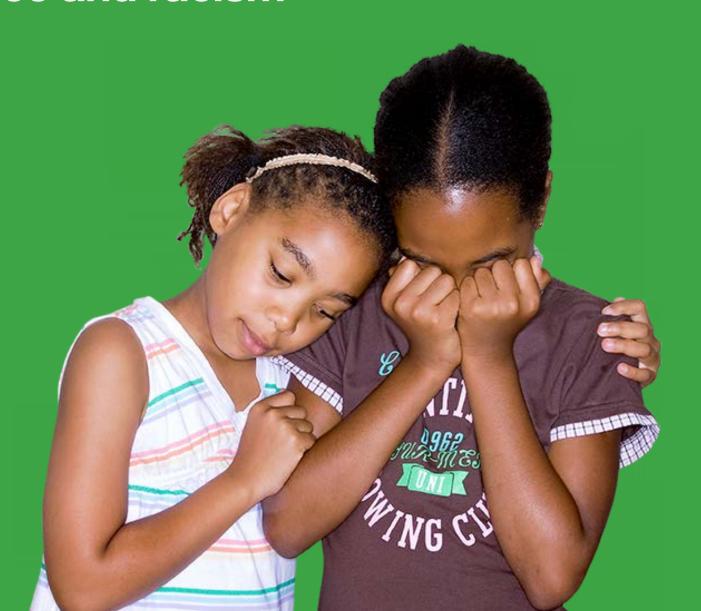


Racism Explained

If somebody is hurt or offended by racism, it is important to listen to them and learn why.



Something might not be offensive to you but might be offensive to another person.



Stopping racism or being anti-racist is important.



If you are comfortable, you can talk about your experiences and listen to others.



You can include people who look different to you.



You can challenge something if you think it is racist.



Always remember, you can talk to an adult if you have been affected by racism.
